A RESPONSE TO VIOLENCE AGAINST RELIGIOUS MINORITIES IN INDIA

A Resolution of Witness

1 **<u>TEXT OF THE MOTION</u>**

- 2 3 WHEREAS since 2014, the rise of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has led to intensified attacks 4 on Muslims, Christians, and indigenous groups. These actions have been driven by the Hindutva ideology, and government-backed anti-conversion laws. Inflammatory hate speech by political 5 6 leaders have also played a role in fueling a surge in violence and discrimination;¹ and 7 8 WHEREAS in the North East State of Manipur, India, where the state government is led by India's Hindu Nationalist ruling Bharatiya Janatha Party (BJP), there has been significant 9 10 violence since May 2023 toward Christians living there. Months of sustained violence has resulted in thousands of homes destroyed, targeted attacks of places of worship and over 70,000 11 individuals have fled to neighboring states and countries:² and 12 13 14 WHEREAS India has enacted anti-conversion laws in nine states, including Uttar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh. These laws, often targeting Christians and Muslims, provide legal cover for 15 Hindu nationalist groups to harass, imprison, and intimidate religious minorities. Under the guise 16 of preventing 'forced conversions,' these laws have been used to suppress religious freedom. 17 Despite Article 25 of the Indian Constitution guaranteeing religious liberty, minorities face 18 19 ongoing repression;³ and 20 21 WHEREAS Christian communities and other religious minorities have been relentlessly attacked. In Manipur state there was significant ethnic violence reported in 2023. "The tribal and 22 predominantly Christian Kuki community faced the brunt of violence from the majority Meitei 23 24 community. More than 200 people were killed, and more than 50,000 people were displaced;"4 25 and 26 WHEREAS Religious minorities such as Christians and Muslims live under constant fear and 27 28 threat in India, the largest democracy in the world. Supported by the National and State 29 governments, the Hindu Nationalist movement commits egregious religious rights violations in 30 India;⁵ 31 **THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Thirty-Fifth General Synod of the United Church 32 33 of Christ condemns all violence against and violations of the rights of religious minorities in

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36	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirty-Fifth General Synod of the United Church of
37	Christ stands in solidarity with and holds in prayer the poor, the marginalized, and religious
38	minority communities facing severe discrimination and violence in India.
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40	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirty-Fifth General Synod of the United Church of
41	Christ joins with the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA (NCC), which
42	passed a "Resolution on the Persecution of Religious Minorities, in India and Beyond" in
43	October 2024 ⁶ and The General Conference of the United Methodist Church, which passed a
44	similar resolution in April 2024 condemning violence against religious minorities in India. ⁷
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46	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, informed by the United States Commission on
47	International Religious Freedom (USCIRF) ⁸ , the Thirty-Fifth General Synod of the United
48	Church of Christ urges the United States government to:
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50	1. "Designate India as a 'country of particular concern,' or CPC, for engaging in systematic,
51	ongoing, and egregious violations of religious freedom, as defined by the International
52	Religious Freedom Act (IRFA)."8
53	2. Advance human rights for all religious communities in India and promote religious
54	freedom, dignity, and interfaith dialogue through bilateral engagement and in multilateral
55	forums.
56	3. Condemn ongoing religious freedom violations.
57	4. Support religious organizations and human rights groups targeted for their advocacy of
58	religious freedom.
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60	BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Thirty-Fifth General Synod of the United Church of
61	Christ calls upon the leaders and members of the United Church of Christ to:
62	1. Contact their respective US Congressional representatives to;
63	a. Bring violations against religious minorities to the attention of the House Foreign
64	Affairs Committee (HFAC) to hold perpetrators of religious violence accountable.
65	b. Urge the Indian government to repeal discriminatory laws like the Citizenship
66	Amendment Act (CAA) and anti-conversion laws.
67	c. Encourage the Indian government at the Central and state levels to ensure that the
68	rights granted in the Indian Constitution to all religious minorities in India to practice,
69	profess, and propagate their religious faith to be upheld.
70	2. Hold the poor, marginalized, and religious minority communities in India in prayer.
71	3. Encourage Global Ministries to continue to be in dialogue with our global partners in
72	India around these issues and to share their concerns and suggestions with the wider
73	church.
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75	FUNDING: The funding for the implementation of the resolution will be made in accordance
76	with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.
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78 IMPLEMENTATION: The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries 79 or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.
